Moreover, don't include irrelevant personal information like age, sexual orientation, health status, marital status and nationality. Also, do not put your photo except if you are going to apply as a model. Lastly, don't handwrite it because maybe they can't read it.

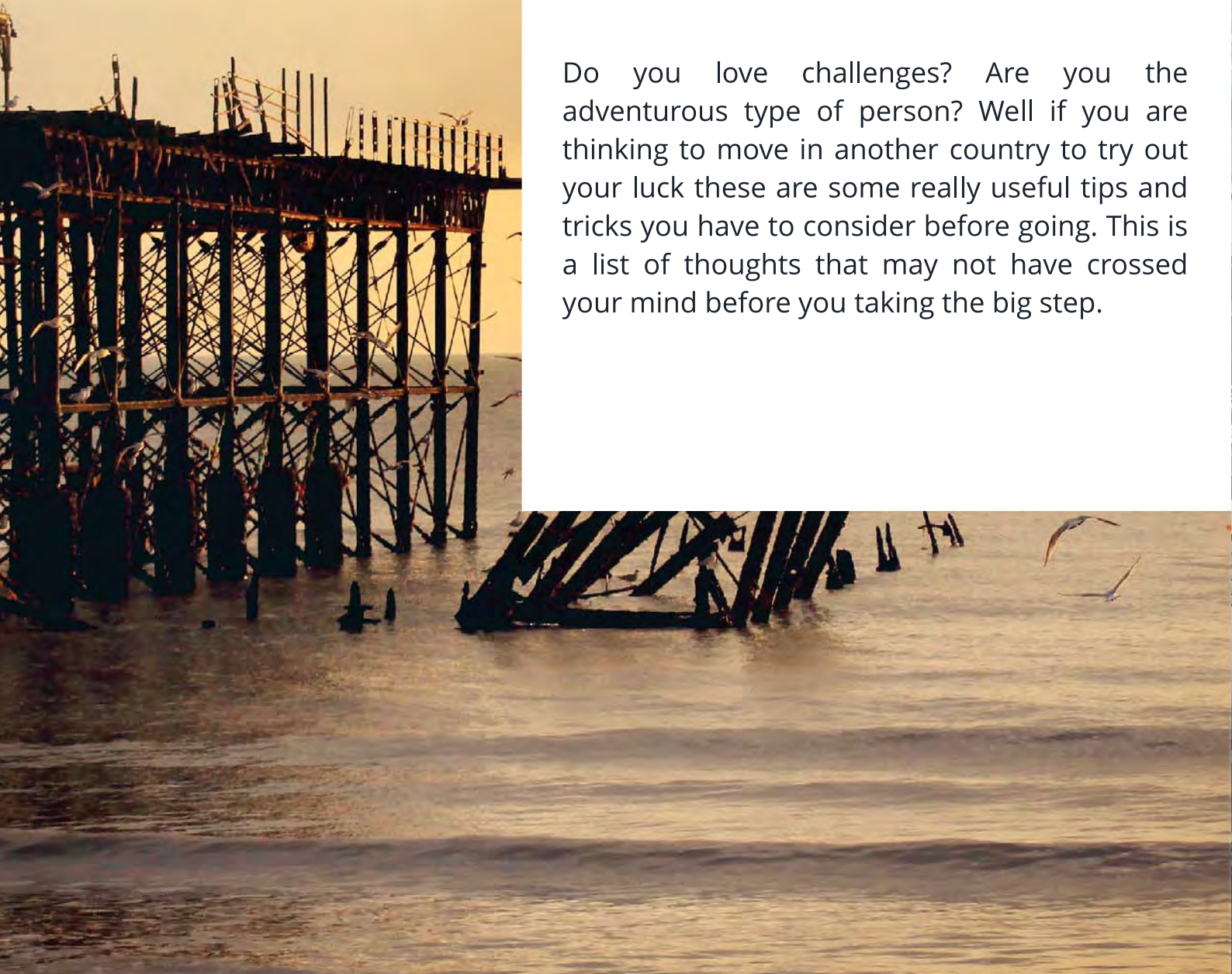
Curriculum Vitae is very important for everyone. There is no perfect CV. I think this article will help you improve your CV.

Bulgaria is located on the Balkan peninsula. It's a EU member, with a population at about 7 million. The capital is Sofia. Main harbors: Varna and Bourgas. The currency is the Bulgarian Lev (1€ = 1.955 BGN). GDP for 2017: 50,4 bln. €

Taxes: 20% on all products. Average salary: 600€ Minimum salary: 255€
